



## School Funding

There has been much in the news recently about school funding. Partly this has been because the government is planning to change the ways that schools are funded from April 2018. The intention is to make this fairer by having a standard system across the country – it may seem surprising that this is not how it is at the moment. The trouble with trying to introduce a common system is that there will be winners and losers, with some schools getting more money and others getting less. We have seen some draft calculations of what the change might mean for us and so far it looks like we should gain slightly.

That should be good news but we could still have less money to spend on our students, and that may seem puzzling. So too might the government's assertion that they are protecting the school budget yet schools are saying they have less money. The answer to both puzzles is the same: the money that has been 'protected' by the government is for children aged 5-16, so funding for Sixth Forms and colleges is not protected. Schools are also being asked to spend more money on things other than education, including higher national insurance and pension contributions. The new apprenticeship levy applies to businesses with a salary bill above a certain level, and a school our size does. This levy alone will take about £15000 from our budget for next year.

School finance is very tight and there is definitely less money available to us to spend, but I thought it was worth explaining how this can be the case.

## Possible New Catholic Schools

The Diocese of East Anglia is intending to submit bids for up to eight new Catholic schools across the region. These bids will be submitted in March and if successful, schools could open as early as 2019. Primary schools are being proposed in Cambridgeshire, Peterborough, Thetford and Norwich. A Catholic high school is being proposed in West Cambourne, Cambridgeshire and possibly a sixth form in Norwich. There is also the opportunity to register your interest in these new schools, which will also allow the Diocese to keep you updated on the proposals. It is important that as many people as possible register their interest on the website as this will provide strong evidence to the government of the need for Catholic schools in East Anglia, making the bids more likely to succeed.

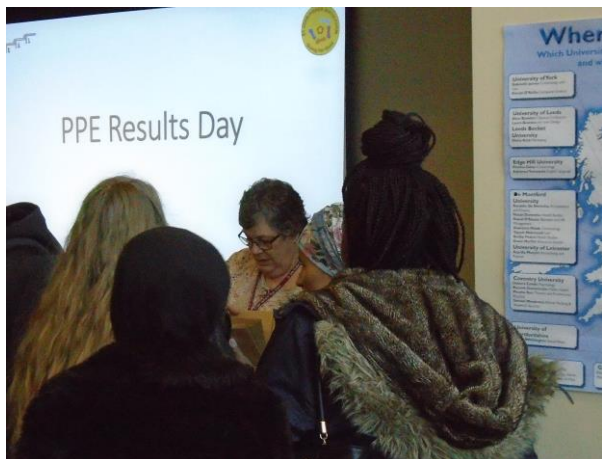
## Christmas Panto Visit
