At the start of term I explained about this new method of reporting GCSE exam results. Each school will be given a decimal number which reflects how much of a grade above or below each of their students were in eight subjects, compared with similar students nationally. We have now been given an indicative figure for 2016, which is

**+0.46**

This is a really impressive figure and likely to put us in the top 10% of schools nationally. We won't know that for sure until Performance Tables are published at the end of the year, but it does mean that our students last year averaged almost half a grade above students nationally. The governors had set a target for this figure to be positive and we were expecting it to be so, but we are all delighted that it is so high. My thanks again go to the teachers and students who worked so hard to achieve this.

## Diocesan Headteachers' Conference

On Monday, the headteachers of the Catholic schools in the diocese met for our annual conference in Norwich. Bishop Alan celebrated Mass for us at the end of the morning, prior to lunch. The main topic of discussion this year is the proposal from the government to lift the cap on the number of places in a new school that may be given to students on the basis of their faith. As all new schools must be so-called Free Schools, this cap has resulted in no new Catholic Schools opening for several years. Now that the cap might be removed it was appropriate to discuss where in the diocese we are short of places and where we might consider applying to open a new school.

Our local group of headteachers (Peterborough and Cambridge) will meet on 20 October to continue this discussion and consider how it might apply to our part of the region.
