



## Key Meetings

On each of the last two Friday's there have been meetings with key people. The first was with our MP, Fiona Onasanya, who met with myself and Darren Ayling, headteacher of King's School, to discuss issues that we wished to raise about education and especially in the Peterborough context. It was a very productive discussion and we were able to share our perspective on a range of items, including funding cuts, the excellent relationships between our city schools, and the particular demographic of our students. Ms Onasanya will be the guest of honour at our Celebration of Achievement evening in June.

The second meeting, last Friday, was with Sir David Carter, the National Schools Commissioner, who met with a larger group of secondary headteachers. This was also a valuable opportunity to share experiences and views of current education policy and how it affects our schools here in Peterborough. Sir David was very attentive and interested to hear what we had to say. He has been a very impressive National Commissioner, the first person to hold the post which was created following the appointment of Regional Schools Commissioners a few years ago. The meeting happened on the day that news broke of Sir David's retirement this summer: he was thanked for his work and wished well in his retirement. It is to be hoped that his replacement is able to continue the excellent work that he has done.

## Futures Easter school

Futures is a university access programme for sixth-form pupils to improve their chances of attending one of the country's top 25 selective universities. Through day trips and a four-day residential Easter School, held at the Universities of Oxford or Cambridge, they provide first-hand experience of higher education to help pupils make informed decisions about what they want to do next. During the Easter Holidays a group of Year 12 students had the opportunity to attend an Easter School at Oxford or Cambridge University. The Easter school which I attended was at Cambridge University, where I completed academic sessions on Biological Sciences / Zoology. The four day residential included talks on applying to competitive courses, an employability skills panel, society taster sessions and advice on coping with university life and managing money. We also had an enterprise challenge to complete within our groups which involved making our own university and there was a formal dinner held at the university. The whole experience was phenomenal, memorable and a real eye opener because it gave us an insight into the life of a student going to such a reputable University. There were many enjoyable moments, but one of the best parts of the experience was listening to the variety of accents from other students around the UK, which was extremely amusing!
