Duke of Edinburgh Awards - Congratulations!

Last weekend, six intrepid Bronze award candidates from Year 10 were assessed by an official D of E assessor as they walked a pre-planned 24 km route in two days. The expedition required participants to walk and camp for two days with the minimum of help from staff. It involved much preparation, with the group learning how to use various navigational techniques to walk in open countryside and various other essential skills. The expedition was made more difficult by the hot weather, in fact it was so hot that they were up at 6am the next day and started walking by 8:30 to try to avoid the hottest part of the day!

The group also had to cook a substantial meal on small camping stoves and they excelled themselves, cooking an impressive array of meals on their tiny stoves. Even Spam was involved!

All the participants worked extremely well together, carrying kit and sharing roles. They walked for about 5 hours each day with fully loaded rucksacks, some were bigger than the walkers! Everyone managed to get from the start to finish - this was not a race but more of a mini marathon. No blisters were reported and the group worked very well together.

The assessor was very impressed with the group as they demonstrated independence, maturity, grit and team spirit and were a credit to our school community. Students will now produce a slide show on their expedition, which will be uploaded onto electronic record books. They will also complete the three other sections of the Award: skills, volunteering and physical recreation and will gain the full Bronze award in September.

Let's Talk with the Vice Chancellor of the University of Cambridge

On Monday 2 July Year 12 had a talk with Professor Stephen Toope, who is the Vice Chancellor of the University of Cambridge. He is a scholar specialising in human rights, public international law and international regulations, and has been the vice-Chancellor of the University of Cambridge since 1 October 2017. He came in to talk to Year 12 about his successful career and also give us a lot of advice on how we can become successful in life. He talked about his life, and all the different places he had been for his job. In 1994 he was a delegate on the UN's observer mission to the first post-apartheid (after the segregation of white and black people) South African General Election. He said that seeing the different ethnicities going to vote together was an amazing sight to see. He told Year 12 to put themselves out there, by doing a lot of work outside school related to what they want to do in the future, such as work experience. In the end the most valuable advice that Professor Toope gave to Year 12 was to "Follow your passion", and he even said that was the best advice he got as well.
