Mercy is shown in many individual ways, but some of the ways we have tried to live out that Mercy as a school include the recent visit from John Pridmore and the St Patrick's Community who spoke to Years 8, 9, 10 and 11, through the continued work of our School Heroes, a group of pupils attending the Ignite Youth Festival in May, taking part in the annual Holocaust Memorial Day services, our school Focus days and in our Celebration of Achievement when we celebrated the accomplishments of our students as well as many others.

To mark the end of the Year of Mercy, the Rochester House Mass, which is taking place on Thursday, 24 November, will be set aside as an opportunity to reflect on the past year and to thank God for all the opportunities to be merciful we have had. As part of this, we will be bringing up cards with examples of times we have shown mercy written on them during the offertory at this Mass.

As we leave the Year of Mercy, we continue to strive towards fulfilling the Merciful calling of Jesus and that of our school Mission – to live life and live it to the full.



## Advent Appeal

The Season of Advent is fast approaching, the time when Catholics and other Christians prepare for the celebration of Jesus' birth at Christmas. It is also an opportunity to step up and show Mercy to others as we mark the end of our Year of Mercy.

The donations for each week are as follows:

Week commencing 5 December: Toothbrushes and toothpaste

Week commencing 12 December: Soup, flannels, towels, hygiene products.

Week commencing 19 December: Warm items of clothing – gloves, scarves, etc.

We would very much appreciate all the help we can get with this appeal – if you have any items you do not need any more or are willing to buy any extra bits to donate while doing your weekly shop it would be hugely appreciated.
